

A View from Calvary

As CACC family, we have a special Sunday worship service every September called Renewal Sunday. Each year we present a biblical slogan, which helps us focus, plan and aim for the coming year. Our topic for this year is "A Renewing Mind". My aim as pastor is to help our church move further in Christian growth. There are many church members who attend churches, make decisions for Christ, and yet have not made a commitment for Christ. Christianity is not static religion. It should not be religion; it should be lifestyle, a transformed lifestyle that helps us grow in faith and become instruments of God in this world.

"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but <u>be</u> <u>transformed</u> by <u>the renewing of your mind</u>. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is - his good, pleasing and perfect will." (Romans 12:2)

Paul sometimes uses verbs in the imperative form and other times in the passive form. Here in Romans 12:2 the form is **passive imperative**. "Be transformed". However, this cannot be done by ourselves. **Only God can change our inner being**. Our mind will be transformed **by the Spirit of our Lord.** All of us are exposed to different ideologies everyday. Let us not allow the "world" to deform us. Most of us spend 40-60 hours working in some kind of occupation. We spend hours with nonbeliever colleagues and friends. We drive and hear all kinds of programs and music. TV, movies and media are strong "teachers" influencing our lives. Our job is to cooperate with God's Spirit by seeking to nurture our minds with information that will **reprogram** our thinking and **will be in line with the values of God.**

Three basic suggestions to the CACC congregation (or to your local church):

- 1. Commit to becoming a disciple of Christ
- 2. **Share a Collective commitment as the body of Christ** (I don't know how one can be a Christian or practice Christianity without a body.)
- 3. **Commit to a ministry** (Involve in one of the ministries of CACC) May God help us.

program that helped the children learn that Jesus gives us the power to be thankful, help others, be brave, live forever, and tell




others about God.

A Visit to Armenian Evangelical Church of Belgium

Recently I had the opportunity to worship with our Armenian Evangelical brothers and sisters in Brussels, Belgium.

Even though there has been a small Armenian population in Belgium for a long time, recent arrivals first from Turkey and later from Armenia has increased the Armenian population to around 20,000 (as with all Armenian census, the numbers are guesstimates).

The Armenian Evangelical Churches in Belgium started in 1991 and presently the Armenian Evangelical Union has 6 churches, two in Brussels, and the others in Antwerp, Hasselt, Liege and Mehelen.

On May 4, 2008 I visited the largest church found in the St. Lambrechts-Woluwe section of Brussels. The Church presently meets in a rented church building, where Rev. Sarkis Pachaian, who is originally from Turkey, is the pastor of the church. There were around 80 worshipers of all ages. The message was given by Rev. Krikor Khayiguian visiting from Valence, France. He spoke in French which was translated into Turkish.

It is interesting to note that there are two distinct worship languages

in Evangelical churches of Belgium. The congregations are comprised of either mostly Armenians from Turkey or mostly Armenians from Armenia, where in the former, the church services are French/Turkish and the latter French/Armenian. The congregation of the church I had the opportunity to visit was mostly from Turkey and during the whole service there was only one song that was sung in Armenian. After church there was reception where the

predominant language was Turkish. I thanked my grandfather who, by not being able to learn Armenian, forced us to learn Turkish, which made my visit memorable.

I left the church blessed and praised God that His word is being preached in various corners of the world to Armenian people in multiple languages (yes, I have heard in my lifetime sermons in Armenian, Arabic, English, French, Italian, Portuguese, Russian & Turkish. All in Armenian Evangelical churches worldwide).

As we concentrate on the work of the Armenian Evangelical Union of North America (AEUNA), let us remember and pray for our sister Armenian Evangelical Churches both in Armenia and in the Diaspora.

We could not have such a wonderful time without you to help and encourage us, so thank




you for your encouragement leading up to the event and for showing your support of us and the church by blessing us with your presence at

Renewal Sunday



On September 14th, nearly 120 people were present at Calvary Armenian Congregational

Church to attend the Renewal Sunday Service for the 2008-2009 vear. The purpose of the service was to encourage the congregation to start the year with renewed and transformed minds hearts and based on the verse from Romans 12:2 "...be transformed with the renewing of your mind."

The service began with Mr. Hagop Nazarian leading the worship service with the accompaniment of the youth band.

Following the worship, the Pastor led the congregation in prayer. Badveli prayed for the Hurricane survivors in Texas, for world peace, for Armenia and Artsakh and for various needs in the congregation. After the Hayr Mer, the children were asked to come to the front to hear the children's message. As the children sat on the floor of the chancel, Badveli surprised the congregation by putting on a bike helmet. He explained to the children like a bike helmet protects the brain and the mind, similarly the Word of God protects our minds and acts as a shield. Following the children's message, Badveli invited members of all CACC ministries and chairs of committees to come forward and share something about their ministries. Fifteen individuals came forward. Badveli prayed for all of the ministries of the church and continued with delivering the Armenian message. The message highlighted the importance of dedication and commitment to the church. He noted that our lives should be a living sacrifice to our Lord Jesus Christ. Badveli continued his message in English after the choir sang "He Hideth My Soul." He stressed the importance of total commitment and outlined three points of a true committed person. First, one has to be committed to be a disciple of Jesus and take personal responsibility and allow Jesus to teach daily. His second point was that one has to have a commitment to a collective community and have a collective responsibility to serve the Lord. Finally, one has to be committed to the ministry and be involved in the church, he said.

The service concluded with the opening of the Lord's Table.

Following the service, a Food Festival fundraiser lunch was held in the Halajian Hall. The lunch menu included Sini Kufta prepared by the Food Festival Committee and Hariseh donated by the Mousa Ler Commemoration Committee.

Obeying the Spirit, Touching Lives

September 9, 2008

John 21:13-18

"Jesus came and took the bread, and gave it to them, and the fish likewise. This is now the third time that Jesus was manifested to the disciples, after He was raised from the dead. So when they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me more than these?". He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You." He said to him, "Tend My lambs." He said to him again a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me?" He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You." He said to him, the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me?" Peter was grieved because He said to him the third time, "Do you love Me?", and he said to Him, "Lord, You know all things; You know that I love You." Jesus said to him, "Tend My sheep. Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to gird yourself, and walk wherever you wished; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will gird you, and bring you where you would not go."

I don't know how many times and on how many occasions I have read this passage as fast as I can, as slow as I can, analyzed it as much as I can, taught about it as fervently as I can, listened to teachings about it as carefully as I can. But never has this passage jumped out of the page and into my feet, hands, and spirit more significantly than this May, when I was charged by Calvary Armenian Congregational Church (CACC) to spend \$2000 of the New York Life Genocide Compensation Fund allocated to CACC, to help the most needy in Armenian villages. An extra \$400 from private individuals meant I had \$2400 to spend in 5 very poor villages familiar to me due to the Stanford Armenian Students' *Act For Armenia* program.

The folks in these villages live hand to mouth daily. They have absolutely nothing left over for an emergency. Every unexpected mishap, large or small, is a major hardship for the entire family. In Akhbradzor village, near Lake Sevan, about 20 miles from the Azeri border, where the road to nowhere seems to end, we supported a woman who needed a hernia operation for months but could not pay for it and we bought flour for the village school janitor and her 3 children whose husband died in the

Kharabakh war. In Antarout village on Mt. Aragats, a 28 year old man (faithful husband and father of two toddlers), working in the rock quarries collapsed

with a heart attack from the heavy work. His hospital bill of \$460 to revive him was weighing heavy on his mind. "How and where would it come from?" As he put it when I told him we will cover it for him, "I did not know, but apparently God knew". In Vaghatin village, in the middle of the country, a 7 year old boy has been walking on the side of his foot for 2 years because he broke his ankle at the age of 5, but the family could

not afford the cost to fix it. "How much?", I asked the school principal who told me the story. "About \$500 to set it back the right way. It's important because the boy is still growing. We have been collecting from the villagers and we already have \$140 dollars. We need \$360 more.". \$140 in 2 years from all the villagers...! That tells me how financially challenged these folks are, but how rich in spirit they are. Oh Lord, help me to learn your priorities like these people have learned. We are giving this boy a new and straight ankle. In Vaghatur village near Goris and in Shvani Dzor all the way in the south on the corner of Azerbaijan and Iran, we are buying some blackboards for the school that has none, helping one family repair their roof, another to plant a small fruit orchard for sustainability and another to buy two sheep for milk and

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I can't tell you how many times I have complained about my busy schedule, lack of time for myself, the liging jealousy of those who would rather tear down my work than elevate theirs and so many other things that "the poor old me" has to "endure". But then [God puts me in touch with people like these villagers, who have absolutely nothing, yet feel compelled to give with a glad heart. And give they must, because it is part of their fabric, part of their being, part of their identity, and part of their longing. Along with their prolific blessings, they gave me apples from the tree in the yard, and edible grass they gathered from the nearby hills for the day's soup. I took it with humbleness and great gratitude, because they MUST give. On the way back, in the public bus from Meghri to Yerevan, filled with the aroma of the sweat of really hard working people, I no longer minded inconvenience. I was lost in my sweet thoughts, "Oh Lord, make me genuine like them! Make my spirit rich like theirs! Help me to see that the blessings they utter to me in your name, more than compensate for any hardship that any man can impose on me. Thank you for trusting me to feed your sheep once in a while! Thank you for moving my church (CACC) in directions that are prepared by you!"
