

DVBS program.


Our general theme for this year was "Praise Him". It

Nerses skyped with Pastor Jiro Ghazarian in Kessab. The


children were able to ask questions about rebuilding after the attack by militants. The children brought in money during the week and raised over \$400 to help VBS in Kessab!

On October 15-16, and before the start of the AMAA meetings, the **Armenian Evangelical World Council (AEWC)** held its annual meeting at the church. The AEWC brings together the following church unions and

organizations: Union of the Armenian Evangelical Churches in the Near East, Armenian Evangelical Union of North America, the Armenian Evangelical Union of France, the Union of the Evangelical Church of Armenia, the Armenian Evangelical Union of Eurasia, the Armenian Evangelical Fellowship of Europe, the Philibosian Foundation and the Armenian Missionary Association of America.



On October 17, the AMAA held its Annual

Mission Report of Armenia

Evangelism in Armenia is against the law, both the government and the Orthodox church are openly against it. Nevertheless, the gospel is not arrested, every church I visited on Sundays was packed with people for worship service. People were very attentive to the preaching and actively participated in worship. There was no formalism in the



church, people worshipped freely and their faith in God was evident in their expressions. It was real and genuine. This was exciting and emotionally moving for me to see and be part of. On the physical side of things, several churches have temporary, somewhat primitive, and small facilities. But, they are growing in numbers and need help to expand their facilities. On the political side of things, many pastors say that the AMAA leadership in the US is not responsive enough to this particular need of theirs, and charge the AMAA with loss of spiritual vision for the spiritually lost of Armenia. One thing for sure, the church is actively witnessing for Christ, and at present, they are the existing centers of evangelism. At CACC, let us commit to help them to grow.



I also visited AMAA's new summer camp, a large and beautiful setting in the mountains. Some of the buildings are still being renovated. During my visit, the young adults were there for a one week retreat, from one of the districts. There were about 100 of them, and in their last day service and under the preaching of Rev. Melkonian, about 80% of them accepted the Lord as their Savior or rededicated themselves to the Lord. Two weeks earlier, there was a much larger group there from another district, with similar response for salvation. I talked with the pastors in the camp and learned that these are common happenings at the camp meetings. Praise the Lord. Rejoice with me, the future generation is in the hands of the Lord.

I visited a number of evangelical churches throughout Armenia and talked with more than a dozen pastors during my 25 day stay in the country. My time with the pastors was primarily a time of sharing, encouraging, praying and counseling on an individual basis. I listened to their needs and expectations, learned of their vision and we prayed together. It was a wonderful time of ministering to each other.

One major emphasis of the AMAA center of Yerevan, directed by Rev. Melkonian, is the training and equipping of the pastors. I participated in the mini-retreats dealing with how to lead a church service, how to preach effectively, church growth patterns, and pastoral responsibilities. I also gave a presentation in one of those mini-retreats on "Sin and the Believer" (from my current book). The presentation was followed by a lively discussion on the grace of God. I noticed a hidden need in these retreats and in my talking to individual pastors - the pastors need to develop spiritual insights and learn personally to walk spiritual lives in complete obedience and humility before the Lord. I fear this is being neglected, they are too concerned with the ministry responsibilities of their church and their pastoral image. This is understandable. Nevertheless, this area needs immediate regular attention. We have 30 evangelical pastors in Armenia and almost all came to

Mission Update on the Armenian Evangelical Church Alina Balabanian in Armavir, Armenia



As many of you are already aware, our church has committed to prayerfully support and encourage the ministry of our sister church in Armavir, Armenia through AMAA's Sister Church program. We were paired with this church by Rev. Mgrdich Melkonian, who oversees the Armenian Evangelical Churches in Armenia. Rev. Melkonian informed us that this church is similar to us because it also is gifted in music ministry. Their church building is packed with people on Sunday mornings for worship.

During this past year we heard that our sister church was in need of a new laptop and projector for their worship and ministry purposes as the one they had was getting very old. They also expressed how during the hot summer months they needed to have a place where they could have their Bible studies, gatherings and fellowship. They noted that they were willing to do the labor themselves but

needed financial help to cover the costs of a patio. For this reason, our church decided to send money to help them build a covered patio outside the church. We recently received a letter from their pastor with these pictures telling us the project has been completed and expressing his gratitude. I was particularly touched by the following line: «Մենք բոլորս շատ ուրակացանք, ոչ միայն նրա համար, որ ուղարկուածները մեզ շատ անհրաժեշտ էին, այլ, որ Աստուած ձեր միջոցով իր հոգատարութիւնն է ցուցաբերում մեր նկատմամբ եւ եւս մէկ անգամ վստահեցնում, որ մեր պայքարների եւ դժուարութիւնների մէջ մենք մենակ չենք։» (Translation: "We all were very happy, not only for the necessities that you sent, but that through your support the Lord showed us His love for us through you and that he reminded us that we are not alone in our trials.") Seeing these pictures of our brothers and sisters in Christ - our own people worshipping and studying the Word of God under that patio and knowing that we were given the privilege and opportunity to contribute to God's Work in Armenia is amazing! Praise the Lord! Please CONTINUE TO HOLD OUR SISTER CHURCH IN PRAYER and may the Lord use our gifts to edify His church and bring people closer to Him. Please continue to pray that God would work in our church - our sister church - the Armenian Evangelical Church of Armavir and in our people in our beloved homeland of Armenia for His glory.

Medical Mission Trip to Armenia

My trip to Armenia has forever changed my life. It was the most humbling and rewarding experience. I was in Armenia on a Medical Mission Trip with a team of about 35 people. To simply put it, our goal for this trip was to heal people spiritually and physically. We had mentally prepared ourselves before the trip that we were going to be unable to cure many patients we saw with medicine and therefore, the importance of sharing the gospel with them was crucial. To give these people hope of an eternal life meant more to our team then providing them with medical care. The structure of our trip was very simple: on the weekends we got to tour Armenia and during the weekdays we were setting up clinics and seeing patients. We travelled to two villages; Vanadzor and Stepanavan where we set up clinics in churches. We were in Vanadzor for 2.5 days and saw a total of 800 Patients and in Stepanavan for 2 days and saw 650 patients, a total of 1450 patients. Yes, the living conditions in Armenia are unbearable and heartbreaking, but there is a happiness within these people that I have never witnessed anywhere else. The




people of Armenia have nothing and yet they were the most generous, genuine, giving, and welcoming people. I did not expect to go to Armenia and feel so deeply connected to the country and its people, therefore, I plan on continuing this amazing work in Armenia every year! I'm very excited to see how God is going to use my talents and knowledge in medicine and the healthcare field in Armenia over the years.
