Surprised By the Blessings

Are you surprised by the teachings of Jesus in Matthew 5-7? Maybe you are not, but the disciples and the crowds around him were. Jesus' teachings were truly revolutionary in a system where people trusted that righteousness was achieved by keeping the law and behaving in a godly manner.

Lately I have been teaching from the Sermon on the Mount. The eight beatitudes, of which begins with the word blessed (*Makarios* in Greek, *Yeranee* in Armenian) are the core of the sermon series. The beatitudes are not things you do so that you become a "happy" person. They do not make a checklist to complete. They are not teachings about behaving properly. No, these teachings are an **invitation to become members in the Kingdom of God**. They start from accepting how much one needs Jesus as Savior, King, Lord, Guide, Teacher, Healer, Comforter, the King of this new kingdom, the new creation. These are teachings of **seeking first His kingdom** and **His righteousness** and all things will come after that...all things. No wonder the first beatitude is being poor in spirit, being empty, seeing how desperately hungry you are and that you need Christ.

One of my pastor friends, Shawn Reese, from PBCC describes the Sermon on the Mount: **"living right-side up in an upside down world."** N.T. Wright says: "God is acting in and through Jesus to turn the world upside down... to pour out lavish 'blessings' on all who now turn to him and accept the new thing that he is doing."

What kind of blessings are you looking forward to this year? A new house, a new car, a new job, a new... something... those are part of God's blessings as well. But my word to you is beyond these blessings. The beatitudes are blessings. Are they blessings in your life?

It all starts with being poor in spirit, as I said before. The poor in spirit are the ones who have realized they are no one if they are not part of the Kingdom of Heaven. The Greek word for poor means extreme, desperately poor. All eight beatitudes flow from being poor in spirit. The poor in spirit are those who say: "I need God, I surrender". Once you are there, you see your sins and the sins of the world around you and you mourn for them and ask for forgiveness. This leads you to be meek, as those who are the ones who are hungry to be fed by God and to have a right relationship with God and with others. That leads you to learn to be merciful, because Jesus is merciful. How can you be merciful if your heart is closed? Pure in heart leads you to see more than yourself in life. You become a peacemaker, which will lead you to be in trouble. In the end, people **will persecute you** for obeying God and becoming his child.

Arlene Shamlian Kazarian was born on September 16, 1925 to the late Hagop and Hranoush Shamlian in Aleppo, Syria. Her family moved to Iraq where she resided as a youngster. Arlene was blessed with a large, Godly family and was preceded in death by her parents, brothers, Puzant, Hrant, Toros and Edward and her sisters, Helen, Evelyn, and Rebecca. Arlene immigrated to the United States as a young teenager accompanied by family friends. She joined her family in San Francisco where she graduated from high school. She was closest in age to her brother Ed who happened to be friends with this nice, handsome, Armenian boy. Ed had to convince Arlene to attend a local dance with him where he introduced her to his buddy, Dick. They fell in love and were married on September 13, 1947. They made their home in San Francisco and were blessed with three wonderful children, a son Alvin, and daughters Carol and Susan.

Arlene was very supportive of her husband Dick. She understood how important his occupation as a police officer was to him, even though there were many dangerous incidents over his career. Her strong faith in God helped her deal with the risks involved in his particular job.

Arlene loved to cook and entertain family and friends in her home in the city, a home that was filled with joy and the smell of baking in the air. Arlene also became proficient at cooking over a Coleman camping stove. Every summer the family hopped in the car and took off for a national park either in California or out-of-state. One of their favorite destinations were Lake Tahoe or Yosemite. Arlene could flip pancakes on the Coleman with the best of them as Dick's favorite breakfast was you guessed it, pancakes! Arlene also became proficient at packing. Even though the pile of camping items looked as if they would never fit in the trunk, Arlene could arrange it all with room to spare. Many wonderful summers were spent in the great outdoors with Ed, Roxie and their kids or her third daughter Marianne Mesrobian Cinfel.

Arlene decided that she couldn't abide the fog in San Francisco any longer and encouraged Dick to move anywhere the sun shined. After more than thirty years in foggy San Francisco, the Kazarians moved to San Mateo. After Dick retired, he and Arlene traveled extensively to Europe, Asia and Africa. Arlene enjoyed meeting new people and experiencing the native cuisine.

Arlene was able to see two of her three children get married and was present for the birth of her three grandchildren; David Hagopian, Richard Hoggan and the late Laura Hagopian.. She was a big influence in their lives and God blessed her mightily as she saw all three grow up into accomplished and successful adults whom she was extremely proud of and would brag about to anyone who was willing to listen. The death of her only grand-daughter tested her faith once more. Although this was an immensely difficult time for her, Arlene was comforted by God's promise that she would see Laura again.

She was an active member of Calvary Armenian Congregational Church for decades. She loved helping to prepare the food for the festival and attended church faithfully, until she became unwell this past August. Back in June Arlene had lunch with Badveli and Sevan. She inquired about the Home for the Elderly in Aleppo, which had been recently bombed by Isis. Arlene decided to donate money to help these people in any way that was necessary. Her donation was the seed money that began CACC's vacation bible school raising over \$1500 for this cause.

She was also an active member in the Daughters of Vartan organization. She maintained many friendships with her sisters over the years and enjoyed attending the many functions until she decided to no longer drive at night. About four years ago, Arlene met a wonderful group of women who walked every morning at the Hillsdale Mall in San Mateo. Arlene enjoyed her time with these lovely, caring women as they exchanged stories of their lives over a cup of coffee; just another venue for Arlene to brag about her grandchildren!

Arlene went to be with her Lord and Savior on September 6, 2016. She was laid to rest next to her beloved husband Dick on September 13, 2016, which would have been their 69th wedding anniversary. She will always be remembered for her warm hospitality, good heart and her love of Jesus. She is survived by her children; Al, Carol, son-in-law Bruce and Susan and her grandsons David and Richard and Richard's fiancée, Luisa and many loving nieces, nephews and friends. We will miss her greatly.
